EA 110 Interpersonal Communication

100 Hours

This course examines communication in the context of personal and professional relationships. Education Assistant students will explore a variety of concepts to improve interpersonal skills. Students will analyze the barriers to effective communication. Students will evaluate their own communication style and reflect on ways to demonstrate respect and sensitivity for cultural differences.

EA 120 Lifespan: Growth and Development

100 Hours

This course provides students with an understanding of developmental stages from infancy to late adolescence with a focus on physical, cognitive, and socio-emotional development. This course provides students with an in-depth look at an Individual Education Plan (IEP) and also examines the need for confidentiality when working with special needs learners. Students will also consider Aboriginal and cultural sensitives.

100 Hours

This course provides students with indepth information about a variety of exceptionalities in schools. Students will learn about mental health, intellectual, physical, medical, and behavioral exceptionalities. In this course the Education Assistant student will continue to explore ways to meet the needs of the students, develop a solid base of knowledge, and a healthy, empathetic attitude toward their work, the child, and the family.

EA 160 Autism, Applied Behaviour Analysis, Augmentative and Alternative Communications

100 Hours

This course provides students with an in-depth understanding of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and the variety of methodologies used to teach learners with Autism. Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) provides a framework for students to observe, record and respond to the needs of students with challenging behaviors in the classroom, including ASD. Educational Assistants will be introduced to strategies, systems, and programs to enhance the learners' ability to communicate and socially interact.

EA 170 Supporting the Whole Child: Strategies to Support Independence

Course outline: An Education Assistant supports the needs of the whole child. In this course strategies, systems, and solutions are explored when working with children with challenging behaviours. Students will learn the importance of reflective practice, developing relationships with all stakeholders, and the importance of communication in relationships. Students will learn what children need to succeed in a classroom, the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) concept, the importance of differentiation, and approaches to supporting academics and social skills. This course also examines the need for positive guidance and the development of observation and documenting skills. Students will explore a variety of ways to look after one's own health and safety including reading an Employee Safety Plan and an Individual Education Plan (IEP) before beginning a daily assignment. Students will also review the duty to report Child Abuse.

EA 180 Capstone Project and the Curriculum

100 Hours

Students will consolidate the knowledge, skills and strategies gained through the Education Assistant program in this course. This will be accomplished by completing a Capstone project in Special Education. Under the guidance of a practicum instructor, the student will pursue independent research on a question, topic, or issue of their choice.

Students will gain an in-depth knowledge of the curriculum. The curriculum is designed to place the student at the centre of their learning. Through personalized learning, choice, and a focus on literacy and numeracy skills, the curriculum is concept based and competency driven to ensure that students are engaged in learning opportunities that encourage creative, critical, and reflective thinking. The "Know-Do-Understand" framework supports deep learning through active engagement.

EA 190 Practicum

180 Hours

The practicum experience is an opportunity for students to integrate the strategies, skills and theoretical knowledge gained in the Education Assistant program. The student will gain the practical experience necessary to work effectively in the school environment assisting teachers in the support of students who present with a wide range of abilities. Students will gain practical, supervised on —the-job training in their role of an Education Assistant.
